The final of the U17 Shires League was played at the Leicestershire Badminton Centre on Sunday April 24. Herts qualified for the final by winning the Southern Group beating Berkshire, Essex, Hampshire, Kent, Surrey and runners-up Sussex, who also qualified for the finals. The qualifiers from the other 3 groups were Yorkshire, Staffordshire, Buckinghamshire, Warwickshire and Leicestershire. The Herts team was: Kamran Haq, Victor Liew, James Reynolds, Nigel Tao, Matthew Westwood, Katie Comras, Frankie Edelman, Kate Lester, Victoria Stokes and Charlotte Willis .

In the first round the group winners played the runners-up of another group, the winners of these matches finishing in positions 1-4, with the others in 5-8.

Herts played Leics and won comfortably 10-0, to join Yorkshire, Bucks and Warwicks, who surprisingly beat No 3 seeds Notts. In the semi-finals Herts beat Bucks 8-2, losing only the 1st boys singles and the first boys doubles. Yorkshire struggled to beat Warwicks, but finally managed a 6-4 victory.

The final started with the mixed, hopefully two bankers for Herts. Kamran/Katie had a winning lead of 11-3, but the Yorkshire pair fought back to win 21-19. Victor/Kate levelled the score with a close fought 21-16 to win the 2nd mixed. The teams shared the boys singles with a win for Nigel, but James was defeated by U15 National Champion Richard Morris. Frankie and Katie won the girls singles to give Herts a 4-2 lead with just the four doubles to play.

Nigel/Matthew won the 2nd boys doubles 21-12 while Kamran/Victor were locked in a titanic struggle finally squeezing home 21-18 to give Herts a winning 6-2 lead. Herts lost one of the girls doubles, but Victoria/Charlotte beat a strong Yorkshire pair 21-16 to remain undefeated throughout the day, as was Matthew. This gave Herts a 7-3 victory, reversing the 6-4 defeat by Yorkshire earlier in the month at the ICT. Warwicks beat Bucks to take 3rd place.

April 2005 has been a fantastic month for the U17 team, finishing 2nd at the ICT, Herts best result since winning the title in 1997 and then to win the Shires League to basically become National Champions. The team, containing seven International players, trains every Thursday at the Hertfordshire Sports Village in Hatfield.

Footnote

U17 team manager, Tony Clarke, was seen pictured with the Shires League trophy at the end of a very successful season. Tony will be in his 25th year as manager of the U17 squad next season. During that time he has seen the Junior County become consistently one of the strongest in the country. His efforts were rewarded last season when the Badminton Association of England presented him with their award for his contribution to English badminton.

U11 Singles and Doubles Challenges

The U11 Singles Challenge took place in Slough on April 30. Six counties competed - Herts, Middlesex, Berkshire, Sussex, Surrey and Essex. The Herts girls were Kate Sellars, Olivia van der Maat, Lexy Richards and Katherine Head; the boys were Nick Barnett, Daniel Hatt, Gareth Lumb and Steven George. The girls played very well, with Kate finishing in 9th place and as a team they were 4th behind winners Essex, Sussex and Surrey. The boys also did well, finishing 3rd behind winners again Essex, and Sussex, with Daniel 3rd and Nick 5th going as part of the regional team to the national final in Milton Keynes in June.

Points from the girls and boys events were added together for an overall total and Herts finished 3rd behind winners Essex and runners-up Sussex, with Surrey 4th, Berkshire 5th and Middlesex 6th.

The U11 Doubles Challenge took place at Stevenage Leisure Centre on May 15. Four counties took part - Herts, Sussex, Surrey and Essex. The Herts girls team was Kate Sellars/Olivia van der Maat and Lexy Richards/Katherine Head. A third individual pair - Chloe Bungey/Amy George - also played. The boys team was Nick Barnett/Gareth Lumb and Harry Angus/Daniel Hatt. The individual boys pair was Steven George/Howard Stobo.

The girls played in a group of eight and the boys in one group of 9. The girls finished 3rd behind Sussex and Essex and the boys team were equal first with Essex. By adding the team points together, Herts ended in 3rd place behind joint winners Essex and Sussex, who had to nominate players for a mixed doubles to decide the overall winner. Essex won comfortably and became regional champions in doubles as well as singles.

They both lost their first games but the second and third pairings lifted their games, much to the relief of the spectators, and won the matches by 2 -1, and so proceeding to the finals.

The results in these matches, however, were different. The girls fought hard against Bedfordshire, but lost the first two games. To their credit they did not give up and managed to win the third game but this meant that they lost 1-2 overall and took the silver medals.

The boys also struggled in their match against Suffolk 1 and just lost the first game 13-15. So the tension mounted for players and spectators alike. However, the second pair stormed to a 15-2 win. Everything rested on the final game which was very tight. However Herts managed a 15-10 win to take the gold medals.

So Herts came home with two 5th places, one 2nd place and one 1st place in an U13 event. An excellent result as all our boys and half our girls are still under 12. Well done, everyone!
